In planning your program, remember that William Jessup University can accept no more than 64 lower division units or 1/2 your total number of units for this major. Those courses numbered 300-400 at William Jessup University are best taken at William Jessup since they are upper division classes. However, WJU is willing to accept as equivalent, three lower division classes as satisfying upper division requirements, with no more than one of those courses within the chosen concentration. In cases where lower division credit is used to satisfy an upper division requirement, students will be encouraged to audit the course at WJU in order to be fully prepared for the comprehensive exam.

Courses within the Psychology major for which no transfer credit will be accepted include: Psychology and Christian Thought, Abnormal Psychology, Human Sexuality, Applied Integration, Cross Cultural Issues in Psychology, Counseling Theory, Counseling Skills, Psychological Testing and Assessment, and Field Work.
