Journal Article—Turabian 17.2.2

Include note number at beginning of citation.

Articles Found in Databases—Turabian 17.2.7

(B)

Newspaper Articles—Turabian 17.4

Generally news articles are listed only in notes (Turabian 17.4).

7. Obituary of Jane Doe, *Doe City Times*, August 11, 2012, national edition.

10. John Doe, “In Remembrance of Jane Doe,” *Doe City Times*, August 14, 2012, national edition.

Abstracts—Turabian 17.5.5

2. John Doe, “Doe Article,” abstract, *Doe Journal* 103, no 16 (April 2010): 210.

Book—Turabian 17.1

(B)

Doe, Jane. *Jane’s View of the Universe*. Janesville: Doe Publishers, 2006.

Chapter or Part of Book—Turabian 17.1.8

Useful for compilations that have several authors.

3. John Doe, “Doe Essay,” in *Profound Essays*, edited by Jane Doe (Janesville: Doe Publishers, 2008), 110-112.

(B)

Doe, John. “Doe Essay.” In *Profound Essays*, edited by Jane Doe. Janesville: Doe Publishers, 2008.

Books Found Online—Turabian 17.1.10

Provide as much information as possible.

(N)

22. Jane Doe, *Jane’s Book*, (Janesville: Doe City Publishers, 2000) under “Jane’s Publications,”

(B)

Doe, Jane. *Jane’s Book*. Janesville: Doe City Publishers, 2000. <http://doefamilywebsite.example> (accessed May 2, 2003).

Books Published in Formats Other Than Print—Turabian 17.1.10

(N)

8. John Doe, *John’s Book* (Janesville: Doe City Publishers, 2001), e-book.

(B)

Doe, John. *John’s Book*. Janesville: Doe City Publishers, 2001. E-book.

Reference Works—Turabian 17.5.3

Use s.v. (sub verbo; pl. s.vv) instead of page numbers for works that are arranged alphabetically.

16. *Encyclopedia Britannica*, 2nd ed., s.v. "Dog."

For works that are not well known, include in bibliography and include publication details.

2. *Doe Encyclopedia*, rev. ed. (Janesville: Doe Publishers, 1995), s.vv. "Sun," "Moon."

(B)

Doe Encyclopedia. Janesville: Doe Publishers, 1995.

Web Sites—Turabian 17.7.1

Include as much information as possible.

22. Doe Corporation Marketing Committee, “Marketing Strategy,” Doe Corporation, <http://doecorp.example> (accessed March 11, 2003).

(B)

Doe Corporation Marketing Committee. “Marketing Strategy.” Doe Corporation. <http://docorp.example> (accessed March 11, 2003).

When there is no named author of the site, give the owner of the site (often an organization). Use descriptive terms for informal content (example: “Star Wars fan site”, “Doe High School team roster” etc.)

Weblog Entries—Turabian 17.7.2

It is accepted to cite only in a note.

3. Jane Doe, “Jane’s Opinion on the War,” Doe Blog, entry posted June 9, 2010, <http://doeblog.example> (accessed August 29, 2010).

Video Recordings—Turabian 17.8.5

(N)

12. John Doe, *Doe Documentary*, DVD, Directed by Jane Doe (Janesville: Doe Media, 2002).

(B)

Doe, John. *Doe Documentary*. DVD. Directed by Jane Doe. Janesville: Doe Media, 2002.

See Turabian 17.8.6. for all online media files, such as podcasts. For sound recordings see Turabian 17.8.4. Cite musical scores as you would a book—Turabian 17.8.7.

Legal Cases—17.9.7

Cite in notes only.

(N)

21. Doe v. Smith, 192.

Note: the example above is a shortened note. For notes with more detail, and for all other legal and public document citations see Turabian 17.9.

Lectures—Turabian 17.6.2

(N)

4. John Doe, “Living as a Doe” (lecture, Doe College, Rocklin, CA, June 27, 2011).

(B)

Doe, John. “Living as a Doe.” Lecture, Doe College, Rocklin, CA, June 27, 2011.

Classical, Medieval, and Early English Literary Works—Turabian 17.5.1

See manual if your paper is a literary analysis or study.

(N)

16. *Beowulf*, line 1011.
